# Head of Service update

As we move into our third year as a service I am proud that we are delivering a great service to victims of crime in Nottinghamshire. It is gratifying to hear that 100% of those surveyed after their case was closed say they are very satisfied with the support received – but even more so when we receive feedback like the one we have shared below. A few weeks ago I also received an email praising the support of one of our Caseworkers – 'If everyone who works within a supportive capacity could have the same qualities and nature as Jane then a lot of people's lives would change for the better...When the world seems a horrible and cruel place it only takes one person to make a difference - and for me that person has been Jane.'

So here's to hoping that in 2019 we empower even more victims to recover from crime, and remind them that there are people out there who will listen and care.

### Our service in numbers

Total number of referrals in the last quarter was 2580 – our largest referral points were:

142 victims were seen face to face

We sent over **150** target hardening materials

We delivered 436 instances of advocacy

Received **54** referrals for restorative justice, this lead to **16** activities

# Our service on the ground

An elderly victim, aged 71 years, was out shopping on the high street when her purse was stolen by unknown means from her handbag; the perpetrators then used her bank card to make purchases. She was contacted by myself within 24 hours of the crime being reported. The victim was clearly shaken up by the crime and she explained that it was "on her mind all the while". She could not understand how quickly the crime had happened and how the perpetrators had spent so much money in such a short space of time after stealing her purse.

The victim was feeling vulnerable, we provided her with a set of purse bells and a purse alarmshe told us that they improved her personal safety and security. Fortunately her bank refunded the money that had been taken. Although the victim was thankful for this she said that she was more upset about the loss of the sentimental items in her purse (family photos) that she never got back.

During a follow-up call the victim explained that she still felt "like a bag of nerves" but was thankful to have "such lovely people around her" to support her during a difficult time, with our support she started to feel much better.

The victim was appreciative of the support provided and thanked me for my "kindness and advice". She stated "the lady was wonderful – just marvellous. It's knocked me for six but she was lovely."

# City, South and North teams update

This year we have provided support in a new and growing crime type: Cyber-crime. This criminality crosses national and international borders and is therefore difficult to deal with due to issues of jurisdiction. Our approach has been one of prevention rather than cure and we advise those caught up in its web to be security aware when shopping on-line. As a fail-safe we are advising people to adopt face-to-face shopping methods: checking and trying before you part with hard earned monies and always using approved and

secure methods of payments, i.e. PayPal. Whilst most of our support is delivered by telephone, we also make face-to-face and community visits to see clients. In addition to this we have a number of community hubs in the City where clients can report crime if they are unable to attend a Police station.

This year our service delivery has been enhanced by informative talks from RED Thread, CPS, Chameleon and Victim Support Homicide, all of which provided a fresh perspective on the victims' journey through voluntary agency support services and the criminal justice system.

The first week in December saw our inaugural Community Point conference, held at Mansfield Civic Centre. It was an opportunity to bring our community points and those organisations working towards becoming points together to look at how we might develop our working collaboration, as well as offer details with regard to future funding opportunities, learn more about restorative justice and hear





about the work of one of our community points, Emmanuel House. We were joined by the Police and Crime Commissioner, Paddy Tipping, who focussed on the benefits of working together to support victims across the county. It also enabled colleagues from partner organisations to network and explore how we might provide mutual support in the future. The day proved to be a success with existing working relationships being reinforced, and new ones forged.

Autumn was a busy time for community engagement. We continued with our ongoing programme of training sessions to community points, and presentations to groups across the county. We met with potential new community points with regard to benefits that this can bring to the communities that they support. Amongst other events we attended the Disability Nottinghamshire AGM in Mansfield and the Bassetlaw Community and Voluntary Service AGM in Worksop. We presented at the Nottingham Mental Capacity Act Forum, offering the ability to reach out to health care professionals from the public and private sector. We joined partners at an event organised by Notts Watch at Bilborough College to talk to public service students about the collaborative approach to preventing crime and supporting victims. In Broxtowe we were involved in the 'Celebrating Older People' events and the White Ribbon campaign. My thanks to all who invited and hosted us.


