

"a credit-bearing educational experience in which students participate in an organised service activity that meets identified community needs and reflect on the service activity in such a way as to gain further understanding of course content, a broader appreciation of the discipline, and an enhanced sense of civic responsibility" (Bringle & Hatcher, 1996).

- 1. Some 2018 Conference charges will fall in 2018-19
- 2. £4125 remains of County Council Grant of £10,500 for creating new schemes; 39 to date. £2,076 remains from an earlier training grant.
- 3. Operating costs were largely met from a PCC Grant of £5,000.
- 4. University of Nottingham supports one of its accountants as a volunteer to prepare NottsWatch accounts for annual return to Charity Commission.
- 5. £8944 donated by Mansfield NHW on winding up.
