# Survey Results

- ▶ Two week survey this month which 1,879 people completed
- ▶ Copies available (web link)
- ▶ 50% of respondents felt: “More crime in last 12 months”
- ▶ Rubbish, Drugs are the top concerns
- ▶ 30% of “other” comments relate to Speeding and parking issues
- ▶ Only 40% felt that the police understand their community issues
- ▶ Only 58% have confidence in the police and 50% in the PCC
- ▶ 426 respondents would like to know more about Neighbourhood Watch

# Paddy Tipping

## Nottinghamshire's Police & Crime Commissioner

- Paddy Tipping was elected as Nottinghamshire's first Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) in November 2012.
- Paddy was re-elected with an overwhelming majority in May 2016.
- P&CC role, in consultation with the Chief Constable, is to:
  1. Set the police budget and
  2. Design the Police and Crime Plan.
  3. Additionally, consult with local people to make sure their views are reflected in the way policing is provided.
  4. P&CC has the power to hire and fire the chief constable.



## Pete Moyes

### CEO Life Skills Education

Peter grew up in Mansfield and started his career as a police cadet with Nottinghamshire Police

He has had roles as:

- Divisional Commander – leading 3 out of 4 divisions, policing gang rivalry and gun crime.
- Assistant Chief Constable
- Director of Nottingham City Council - responsible for the Crime and Drugs Partnership

He now leads Life Skills Education Charity working to help young people through early intervention programmes

## Stuart Wright

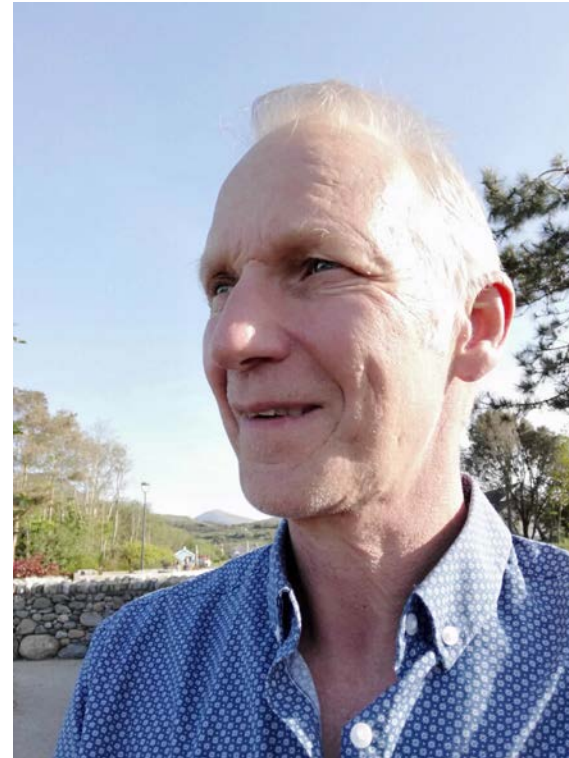
### Mansfield & Ashfield NHW C2P

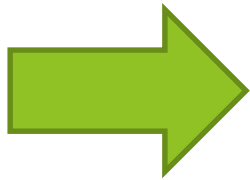

Appointed in 2017, Rachel joined Nottinghamshire Police after 29 years service with South Yorkshire Police working in several operational roles, at different ranks.

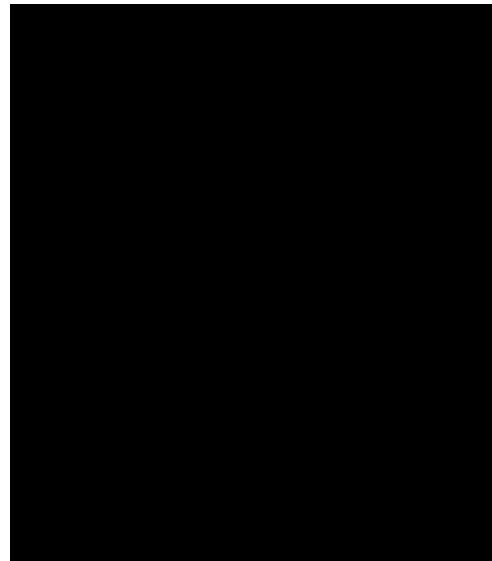

- ▶ • To promote good citizenship and greater public awareness by increasing public participation in the prevention and detection of crime, reducing the fear of crime, improving police/community liaison and increasing community safety.
- ▶ • To address loneliness, isolation, vulnerability and enhance neighbourliness in line with Nottinghamshire Police Force priorities.
- ▶ • To provide effective communication to support communities, reduce crime and improve community cohesion.

# Proposed Constitution

- ▶ Alert issued during May: 23 June 2018 AGM - Please refer to the Draft Constitution 2018 on our website. Click [here](#) to view.
- ▶ The main changes are:
  - ▶ 1) To reduce the minimum number of members on the Executive Committee from 6 to 4.
  - ▶ 2) To amend the Aims and Objectives to comply with the current Home Office and Nottinghamshire PCC's requirements.
  - ▶ 3) To amend membership in line with current data protection regulations.
- ▶ The rest of the changes are cosmetic e.g. references to the City and County has been replaced with the Nottinghamshire Police Force area; Nottinghamshire Neighbourhood Watch has been replaced with NottsWatch.
- ▶ Other cosmetic changes are to make better reading.
- ▶ Any comments, observations or objections should be sent to the Secretary at [admin@nottswatch.co.uk](mailto:admin@nottswatch.co.uk) to be received by the 9th June 2018.

No comments were received.

# General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR)

- ▶ NottsWatch ® have sought guidance from our national team (NWN) and service provider for Neighbourhood Alert (VISAV) via NottsWatch website.
- ▶ VISAV is the data controller, providing members are signed up to neighbourhood alert. Paper applications are available, if you or your members do not have internet access.
- ▶ Unless you want to undertake all the responsibilities of being a Data Controller, load your member details on the Alert system and take advantage of the free GDPR compliant system. Alternatively:
