However, we have received a small P&CC grant and maybe able to help. Any requests should give full details of the scheme, what the funding is specifically for and what steps, if any, have been taken to raise the funds.

* Street/house to house collections should be registered with the police, although there is no legal obligation. For example, a charity collection such as "Save the Children" "Oxfam" Salvation Army will advise the local police that they will be collecting in a certain area over a certain period. If the collectors do not register the Police are likely to be called by public who may be concerned about the legitimacy of the collection, this will cause an unnecessary police deployment to check the legitimacy of the collection.
